Yunus Peer, a teacher at Punahou School in Hawaii, implemented this professional development project for teachers in 2001 under the guidance of former South African education minister, Prof. Kader

Asmal.

The project has evolved into TABSA, which is now in its 16th year. Since 2001, nearly 5 000 Southern African teachers have attended TABSA workshops that have been facilitated by more

than 100 volunteer maths and science teachers from the USA. According to RSA government estimates, more than 1.5 million students have benefited from this intervention.
