Yes of course, we had a few illnesses, but the spirit and love of this large team was a sight to behold. They worked seamlessly while filling in and caring for each other.

Jim, Veronica and Carol were good Captains. They were easily accessible, approachable and they led their teams very well. Our support team worked well together.

Thanks to all 2018 TABSA members for making a huge difference in the learning and teaching of mathematics and science in South Africa.

The TABSA team donated 6 laptops to needy students, gave supplies to the School for the Deaf and Blind, supported the uniform project and the sanitary towels project, all to the TbaNchu community through Ziphakamise, a social welfare organization based in KZN. All this is highly appreciated. Blessed is the hand that giveth.

The 2018 TABSA workshops ended with a lunch and award ceremony with the honorable MEC, Tate Makgoe, the true mover and shaker of education in the Free State.
