Working with Teachers in Bethlehem









As with our learners, building trust with the teachers was essential. I wrote the CAPS standards on the board daily, which was a change from last year, and it helped refresh me on the specifics of CAPS as I planned the day's activities. The teachers enjoyed collaborating in groups and debating the finer points of mathematical problems. We discussed the struggles students face and how different teachers present the material in their classes, with teachers presenting at the front of the room. We also had a chance to do hands-on activities that gave some teachers a better perspective of the topics and provided others with ideas for classroom activities.

We explored transformations, including translation, reflection, rotation, and enlargements and reductions, using tracing paper. This allowed learners to see the transformations happen rather than having to imagine them. We also demonstrated how to do these on the chalkboard using a larger piece of tracing paper. Additionally, we clarified misconceptions on other topics, like congruence and similarity, and discussed strategies to help our learners avoid the same misunderstandings.
